

Fly Pattern Sheet - Everglow Fly

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Hook: Salmon; stout ring eyed
Thread: Danville Plus, color to match fly
Weight: .035 lead
Underbody: Chenille; Yarn; Poly
Tail: Frayed end of tubing body
Body: Everglow tubing
Underwing: Calftail or Bucktail
Wing: Everglow Flashabou
Hackle: Saddle Hackle, collared



Notes: This fly originally showed up in orange, green, white, and orange/white combination. Green has remained the most popular color for King Salmon, which seem to like this fly, especially in low light and/or off colored water.



Wrap the your lead around the hook shank. Leave extra room at both the rear and front for the body materials to be tied off.




Bind down the lead and tie chenille (or yarn) behind the lead and bring the thread forward. Wrap the chenille/yarn forward, tie it off, and clip the excess.



Wrap your thread rearward to the start of the bend. Cut a piece of tubing the length of the hook. fray the back a bit and slip it over the shank. Work the thread into the frayed tubing.



Pinch the frayed tubing (tail) with your off hand and capture the tubing with a couple soft loops. Tighten the wraps and whip finish the rear of the body. Cut your thread.



Using two soft loops capture the front of the tubing and tie down in front of the underbody. Cut away any stray tubing fibers.



Tie down a bit of stiff underwing material. (Calftail is my favorite.)



Tie in a wing of Everglow Flashabou. Taper your thread wrap to the eye.



With the thread just in front of the wing, tie in a saddle hackle by it's tip. Bring your thread foward to the eye.



Wrap the hackle in tight wraps forward. Once you have the hackle dense enough, unwrap your thread until it meets the hackle stem. Tie off the hackle, clip the excess, and collar the hackle with a smooth head. Whip finish and clip the thread.

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
